BURN PERMITS

The Municipality of Tweed would like to remind residents that permits are required for any outdoor burning.

Last summer much of Ontario experienced extensive burning restrictions due to extremely dry weather.

Burning conditions are posted on our website www.tweed.ca and a notice of any burning bans will also be posted. When a burn ban is in place there is no burning permitted, even if you hold a burning permit.

Residents are reminded that any large burning during the day is to be called into the Fire Department before AND after the fire. Please call **613-391-8857** prior to starting your fire.

Burn permits are available for purchase at the Municipal Office Monday-Friday 8:30 a.m.-4:30 p.m. The cost is \$10.00, and they are valid until December 31st.

You may also purchase burn permits at the Tweed Public Library on Saturdays 10-3.

REMINDER: If your carbon monoxide detector is 7-10 years old it needs to be replaced!

We are pleased to have received \$118,250 for an Arena Energy Retro Fit, \$25,312 for a Farm to Table Community Celebration, \$5,000 for marketing, \$2,800 for a hydration station at the Arena, and \$70,750 to revitalize the Stoco Lake Boat Launch. Quinte Waste Solutions Update

In 2016, Tweed residents kept over 335 metric tonnes out of landfills by participating in the blue box program!

We would like to thank the residents of Tweed for participating in the Battery Buddy pilot program. Residents recycled thousands of batteries last year through this pilot study.

Electronic waste, or e-waste, will no longer be collected at our hazardous waste collection events. Residents are now asked to take electronic waste to the e-waste bin at the Tweed landfill.

After being told by remanufacturers that black plastic was not being recycled, we had to let residents know that black plastic is not accepted in the blue box. Unfortunately it is just garbage. Try to avoid purchasing this material if at all possible.

Protecting Your Well

Eastern Ontario experienced one of the driest summers on record last year. The lack of precipitation led to low level water advisories issued by numerous conservation authorities across the province. Though low level warnings have ended, there has been an impact on groundwater.

As a result of the lack of precipitation, groundwater levels reached lows that we have not seen in many years. Water shortages can and did occur across Eastern Ontario as a result.

Groundwater levels are usually highest during April, and then gradually decline until early fall. With a lack of precipitation it is not unusual to experience well issues. If you experience well issues for the first time you should first check your pump and pressure system for mechanical failure. You should also check your water level and record water levels in your well.

Well owners are obliged to maintain wells on their properties, and, if you are experiencing issues, have a licensed well contractor do the necessary repairs.

If your water shortage is temporary an above-ground water storage tank can provide short-term relief. Always be sure to check that the source of the water to be stored is potable, and test it regularly. Water testing bottles are always available at the Municipal Office.
